SBC have put in a road closure order for Church Road, between the top of Pack Hill and Kite Hill. This is due to start from 19th April for about a week. This will affect travel to school from the Commonhead roundabout direction, but will not impact on the High Street, Ham Road or the section of Church Road from Callas Hill to Kite Hill.

On the positive side, The Marsh / Burycroft has now re-opened, so traffic could come from Commonhead that way, up the High Street and along Rotten Row.






## The Lighthouse keepers Lunch by David and Ronda Armitage Review by Mr Day, Year 1
